ABOUT CARMEL COLLEGE FOR WOMEN

Carmel College of Arts, Science and Commerce for Women is nestled at the foot of the hills in the village of Nuvem, Goa. It has the distinction of being the first and only college for women at undergraduate level in the state of Goa till date.

The College is run by the sisters of the Apostolic Carmel congregation. The pioneers of this prestigious institution were Mother Theodosia A.C. the then Superior General of the congregation, Sr. Amabel A.C., the then superior of Fatima Convent, Margao and Monsignor Ronald Knox, the Internuncio. Sr. Amabel felt the need to start a Women's College in Goa and she expressed her desire to her friend Dona Thelma da Costa Lourenco of Margao, who herself was working extensively in the field of education for several years in Bombay. Dona Thelma donated 35 acres of land at Nuvem for erecting a college for women as it had been her deep longing to see Goan girls pursue higher education.

The college had begun with the faculty of Arts and Science at undergraduate level, but today it can boast of its expansion. The additions are the faculty of Commerce (1987); post-graduate courses in Commerce (M.Com.) (2007) with specialization in Management and Accountancy, M.A. in Psychology with specialization in counseling and clinical psychology (2007). The college has added to its credit a post- graduate course M.Sc –Food Technology in 2017. The College is Re-Accredited by NAAC with 'A' grade (4th Cycle) and score 3.25.

We are proud to announce our collaboration with the HAS University Netherlands and Post Graduate Department of Food Technology, Goa State Biodiversity Board (GSBB) Saligao Goa and Biodiversity Research Cell Department of Zoology (BRC) , Anyay Rahit Zindagi Vasco Goa (ARZ) and Department of Psychology, Nirmala Institute of Education (NIE) and Department of English, Goa Institute of Public Administration and Rural Development (GIPARD) and Carmel College, Srinivassa Sinai Dempo College of Commerce and Economics, Bambolim, Goa, Global E-Waste Management System, Margao, Goa, Rotary Club of Margao Midtown, Fierce Kitchen, Goa.





ADMISSION RULES

1. Admission list shall be put up on the college website. Full fees of the first term must be paid. Admission is confirmed only on the payment of all fees for the first term.
2. All admissions are valid only for a year and are therefore to be renewed for each subsequent year of study.
3. The Principal reserves the right to refuse admission to a student whose past academic record and conduct are considered unsatisfactory.
4. Students coming from other colleges should contact the college office with the admission form duly completed, together with a no objection certificate and a character certificate from the last college attended by them.
5. Students will have to give a declaration if they have registered themselves at any other college and have taken admission in this college at the same time.
6. While applying for admission to the Semester I class, students should submit the following:
 - a) HSSCE/ Equivalent Statement of marks cum Passing Certificate (one true copy)
 - b) HSSCE/Equivalent leaving certificate – (Original copy)
 - c) One colored photo: Size: 3.5cm x 2.5 cm
 - d) Students admitted on the basis of Provisional Statement of Eligibility, have to submit a migration certificate in addition to the above.
7. A late fee is levied on fees not paid by the appointed day.

9. On confirmation of admission, student along with the parent will have to submit an online undertaking at www.antiragging.in and www.amanmovement.org

CODE OF CONDUCT

1. Carmel College always expects its students to conduct themselves with dignity, decency and decorum. They are expected to keep up to high morals even outside the college campus so as to keep up the name of the college.
2. All the students are responsible to the college for their conduct on the College premises. Students of this college shall abide by the rules that may be made by the Principal or by the persons authorized by her from time to time. Disobedience, misconduct, misbehavior, sexual harassment or failure to comply with any of the rules will entail punishment including expulsion from the college.
3. Every student must wear the College Identity Card during college hours, college and University examination. Failure to do so will entail a fine of Rs.100/- per violation. The Identity Card shall be returned to the College Office without fail for cancellation when the student leaves the college.
4. No student should invite any outsider to attend classes, functions or for any other purpose without the prior permission of the Principal.
5. Students applying for certificates, testimonials, letters of reference or any other document requiring the Principal's signature should apply for the same in writing and claim them from the office after three days. No papers should be brought by the students directly to the Principal for signature.
6. Students should take particular care to be punctual at all lectures and practicals. Absence from a single lecture must be justified in writing and if prolonged illness is the cause, a medical certificate must be submitted on the day of resuming class.
7. On duty record for absence due to participation in activities to be submitted on the following day of the activity.
8. A minimum of 75% attendance in lectures and practicals is required for students to answer their Semester End Examination. The attendance shall be taken for each lecture/practical separately. In case of science students, attendance for both theory and practicals shall be separately tabulated. As per OA.17.3, students having less than 75% attendance will be debarred from answering the Semester End Examination.
9. Any student having grievance about her attendance should notify the college Principal in writing within three days from the date of declaration of attendance on the College Notice Board.
10. Students should read the notices displayed on the College notice board from time to time.



However, some urgent notices may be read out in the class-rooms.

11. Ragging is a cognizable offence and is banned in the institution. Anyone found indulging in 'ragging' is likely to be punished appropriately, which may include expulsion from the college by the Principal (as per directives received from Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Goa No. 9/2/2001/HE/415 dated 07/03/2005).
12. Students will form no association and will arrange no meetings in the College, without prior permission of the Principal.
13. Students should not loiter in the college corridor or cause disturbance on the College premises while the classes are in progress or at any other time.
14. Use of any narcotics or illegal substances on the college premises is strictly prohibited.
15. Students are expected to take proper care of the college property and to help in keeping the premises neat and tidy; damage done to the college property is a breach of discipline and will be dealt with severely.
16. Students will refrain from selling tickets or coupons of outside organizations in the college without the prior permission of the Principal.
17. Students are requested not to give the college address for their personal mail.
18. Students will be allowed to use cell phones in the classrooms strictly for academic purposes only, with the permission of the concerned teacher.

The decision of the Principal / Manager in all matters shall be final and binding on all students.

Ragging and Anti Ragging Rules

RAGGING CONSTITUTES ONE OR MORE OF ANY OF THE FOLLOWING ACTS:

- a) Any conduct by any student or students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing, treating or handling with rudeness a fresher or any other student
- b) Indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activities by any student or student which causes or is likely to cause annoyance/hardship/physical or psychological harm or to raise fear or apprehension thereof in any fresher or any other student.
- c) Asking any student to do any act, which such student will not in ordinary course do and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or torment or embarrassment, so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of such fresher or any other student.
- d) Any act by a senior student that prevents, disrupts, or disturbs the regular academic activity of any other student or a fresher.
- e) Exploiting the service of a fresher or any other student for completing the academic tasks assigned to an individual or a group of students.
- f) Any act of financial extortion or forceful expenditure burden put on a fresher or any other student by students.
- g) Any act of physical abuse including all the variants of it; sexual abuse, homosexual assaults, stripping, forcing obscene and lewd acts, gestures, causing bodily harm or any other danger to health or person.
- h) Any act or abuse by spoken words, e-mails, post, public insults etc. which would also include deriving perverted pleasure, vicarious or sadistic thrill from actively or passively participating in the discomfiture to fresher or any other student.
- i) Any act that affects the mental health and self-confidence of a fresher or any other student, with or without an intent to derive a sadistic pleasure or showing off power, authority or superiority by a student over any fresher or any other student.

ACTION TO BE TAKEN BY THE HEAD OF THE INSTITUTION

On receipt of the recommendation of the Anti-Ragging Squad or on receipt of any information concerning any reported incident of ragging, the Head of institution shall immediately determine if a case under the Penal law is made out and if so; either on his/her own or through

a member of the Anti-Ragging authorized by him or her in this behalf, proceed to file a First Information Report (FIR) within 24 hours of receipt of such information or recommendation, with the police and local authorities, under the appropriate Penal Provisions relating to one or more below mentioned act.

- i. Abetment to Ragging.
- ii. Criminal Conspiracy to Ragging.
- iii. Unlawful assembly and rioting while Ragging
- iv. Public Nuisance created during Ragging.
- v. Violation of decency and morals through Ragging
- vi. Injury to body, causing hurt or grievous hurt
- vii. Wrongful restraint
- viii. Wrongful confinement
- ix. Use of Criminal force
- x. Assault as well as sexual offences or unnatural offence
- xi. Extortion
- xii. Criminal trespass
- xiii. Offences against property
- xiv. Criminal intimidation
- xv. Threat to commit any of the above mentioned offences
- xvi. Physical or Psychological humiliation.
- xvii. Any other offences following from the designation of “Ragging”.

Provided that Head of the institution shall forthwith report the occurrence of the incident of ragging to the District level ARC and the office of the affiliating University, if the institution is an affiliated Institution. Institution shall also continue with its enquiry initiated under clause (9) of these regulations and other measures without waiting for action on the part of police/local authorities and such remedial action shall be initiated and completed immediately and in no case later than a period of 7 days of the reported occurrence of the incident of Ragging.

ADMINISTRATIVE ACTION IN THE EVENT OF RAGGING

Sub Clause: 1. The institution shall punish a student found guilty of Ragging after following the procedure and in the manner prescribed herein under:

- a) The Anti-Ragging Committee of the institution shall take an appropriate decision, in regard to the punishment or otherwise, depending on the facts of each incident of ragging and nature and gravity of the incident of ragging established in the recommendations of the Anti-Ragging Squad.
- b) The Anti-Ragging Committee may, depending on the nature and gravity of the guilt established by the Anti-Ragging Squad, or award to those found guilty one or more of the following punishments namely:
 - i. Suspension from attending classes and academic privileges
 - ii. Withholding /withdrawing scholarship/fellowship and other benefits.
 - iii. Debarring from appearing in any test/examination or other evaluation process.
 - iv. Withholding results.
 - v. Debarring from representing the institution in any regional, national or international meet, tournament, youth festival etc.
 - vi. Suspension/expulsion from the hostel
 - vii. Cancellation of admission.
 - viii. Expulsion from the institution and consequent debarring from admission to any other institution for a specific period.

Provided that where the persons committing or abetting the act of ragging are not identified, the institution shall resort to collective punishment.

- c) An appeal against the order of punishment by the Anti-Ragging committee shall lie.
 - i. In case of an order of an institution affiliated to or constituent part, of a university to the vice-chancellor of the University.
 - ii. In case of an order of a University to its Chancellor
 - iii. In case of an institution of national importance created by an Act of Parliament to the Chairman or chancellor of the institution as the case may be.

Prohibition of sexual harassment

‘The sexual harassment of women at work place (prevention, prohibition and redressal) Act 2013’ and rules framed thereunder are in accordance with the University Grant Commission (prevention, prohibition and redressal of sexual harassment of women employees and students in Higher Education Institutions) Regulation 2015.

Roles and responsibilities of employee and students

It is the responsibility of all to respect the rights of others and to never encourage harassment.

It can be done by -

- Refusing to participate in any activity which constitutes harassment
- Supporting the person to reject unwelcome behaviour
- Acting as a witness if the person being harassed decides to lodge a complaint
- The identity of the complainant, respondent, witnesses, statements, and other evidence obtained during the enquiry process, recommendation of the committees, and action taken by the employee are considered confidential materials, and should not be published or made known to the public or social media.

Department of English

The Department of English delivers syllabi in Language, Literature, Communication and Soft Skills, Business Communication, Digital Story-telling, as well as mainstream literary studies, Performance Arts and media studies. Students are encouraged to participate in extra and co-curricular activities and nurtured to hold positions of leadership at the college and community level. They are also trained to participate in state and national level events. Activities like creative and travel writing workshops, guest lectures, meetings with writers and poets, active involvement in the Goa Arts and Literary Festival encourage interactive learning.

Alumni from the department have pursued further studies at prestigious institutions like St. Xavier's Institute of Communication and Sophia Polytechnic Mumbai, besides Postgraduate and B.Ed degrees at Goa University. Many hold successful jobs and pursue careers in teaching, public relations, event management, journalism and the airlines.

Department of Hindi

The Department of Hindi was started in the year 1964, with the establishment of the college itself. Students are offered General and Honors degree in Hindi. Apart from the normal teaching, the department organizes field trips, study tours, guest lectures, workshops, seminars and other activities to enhance teaching-learning. Every year the department celebrates important events like Tulsidaas and Premchand Jayanti. Various competitions like Essay Writing, Slogan Writing, Poetry Writing etc are organized to celebrate Hindi Day. The students are encouraged to participate in the Intercollegiate competition "Srujanotsav" organized by Institute Menezes Braganza, Panaji – Goa to commemorate Hindi day.

Department of Konkani

The Department aims to train students to be proficient in the official language of the state by speaking correctly and writing according to the guidelines given by the Konkani Academy. Students are sensitized to the richness of Konkani which is written in five different scripts: Devanagri, Kannada, Roman, Malayalam and Arabic. Accordingly the Department regularly conducts curricular and co-curricular activities like workshops in Tiatr and Street Play acting and dialogue delivery, guest lectures by authors from Goa and Karwar, Inter Collegiate Poetry Competition, field trips, study tours to Bhatkal and Hasan, Mangalore to interact with people writing in the Kannad and Arabic scripts. Students graduating in Konkani are mostly employed as school teachers, lecturer, translators, comperes and research assistants.

Department of Psychology

The Department of Psychology has evolved as one of the prestigious centres for studying the subject in Goa. It features contemporary and experiential learning environments wherein students and teachers collaborate to instill a scientific temper which includes questioning, observing physical reality, testing, hypothesizing, analyzing and communicating. To this end, the faculty members strive to provide opportunities for students by conducting various workshops, guest lectures, psychology festivals, field trips to NGO's and rehabilitation centres. Equipped with a wide-range of tests, equipment and state-of-the-art learning technologies, students gain high quality learning opportunities and intellectual excellence in understanding human behaviour and mental processes.

The subject offers prospects of benefits towards expertise and prepares the students for careers in both academic and applied settings, such as in education, NGO's, psychotherapy, law, social work, medicine, business, hospitals, and so on.

Department of History

The objective of the department is to encourage the learning of history as it takes us back to our roots, tradition and culture and helps us to avoid the mistakes of our past and plan for the future.

The Department of History organizes a number of activities ranging from National- level seminars, workshops, inter-college events, study tours, besides observing days of national importance.

The department in collaboration with MARG has founded a Civic Club, to cultivate in our students a sense of civic consciousness. Yet another highlight is a certificate course 'History through Heritage', annually organized by the department, to instil in our students a love for heritage and its preservation. The Department has seen outstanding results at the Third Year level, with students topping in the subject and being awarded the prestigious Peter Alvares Award.

History offers several career opportunities in the areas of Postgraduate Studies in History, Archaeology, Museology, Latin American Studies, Research leading to Ph.D, Competitive Exams like I.A.S, U.P.S.C, G.P.S.C, Law, Journalism, Teaching, Police Services, Management Studies, Travel and Tourism and Politics.

Department of Economics

The Department is committed to excellence in teaching, research and all-round development of students. We endeavor to provide the students with analytical skills and enthrust them to think critically about the economic issues. We aim to create awareness in our students on the economy-environment inter-linkages and to encourage them to engage in local, national and global economic policy and issues.

To make the teaching learning process effective and interactive the department conducts a number of activities not only relevant to the curriculum but which also help the students to get acquainted and updated with the current issues, develop critical thinking as well as prepare them for career opportunities.

Some of the activities conducted are student seminars, debates, policy analysis, article synopsis and reviews, field trips, study tours and add-on and skill enhancement courses. The department strives to equip our students with skills to be committed and dynamic women leaders, entrepreneurs, innovators, employees and educationists.

Department of Political Science

The students Political Science have the distinction of being awarded the G.D Parekh Scholarship for securing the highest marks in Political Science and are also perusing M.Phil and Ph. D at the university level.

Department of Chemistry

The department has two well equipped laboratories enabling the students to get hands on experience in laboratory techniques. Apart from this the department is instrumental in extracurricular activities which include field trips to multinational industries and institutes of research, the chemistry quiz is an annual event of the department as well as the celebration of science day which gives the students the opportunity to be creative and showcase their talent. Completing a Bachelor in Chemistry gives the student a wide range of career opportunities from continuing their further studies in academics to working as research assistants in national laboratories, in Research and Development sections of pharma companies, in quality control and quality assurance departments in industries, in teaching positions in schools and colleges.

Department of Physics

At Carmel College, the Department of Physics provides a strong foundation in Physics so as to prepare students for future educational and career challenges.

The student should understand science in its true sense, through models, intense observation and meticulous experimentation and for this the department strives to develop the skills of the students.

The well-equipped laboratory with ample instruments and experienced faculty makes an ideal place to measure and explore physics. Dedicated and experienced faculty members have consistently provided good academic record resulting 75% of our student to go for higher studies.

For enrichment of the subject, the faculty organizes study tours / national/ state level programmes. Students get an exposure to Experimental Demonstrations of Physics Concepts by Nationally reputed Physicists, Night SKY Observations etc. Department has coordinated with Goa University, IAPT (Indian Association of Physics Teachers), Inter-University Accelerator Centre, New Delhi to organize activities like Refresher Courses, Annual Conventions, Workshops and National Seminars. The college is a designated center for the conduct of National Graduate Physics Examination (NGPE). Students are encouraged to answer these exams.

Department of Botany


The Department of Botany offers a degree of Bachelor of Science in Botany taught by highly qualified, experienced and dedicated faculty committed to excellence in teaching, research and

all-round development of students. The faculty regularly attend seminars and conferences and have publications in national and international journals. Well-equipped laboratories, Plant Tissue Culture Laboratory, Shade House, Botanical Garden, Herbarium and Museum of Natural History are distinctive features of the department.

Regular field visits, institutional visits and study tours to places of botanical interest in and outside Goa are an integral part of the teaching of Botany to give a complete understanding of the subject. Guest lectures, workshops and certificate courses are organized on a regular basis. Some of the workshops organized by the department include ‘Terrarium’ Kokedama’, ‘Developing Botanical Drawing Skills’, ‘Home Wet Waste & Garden Waste Composting’ and ‘Herbal Soap Making’ in an attempt to encourage skill development in students. Skill-based courses in ‘Nursery and Gardening’, ‘Post-harvest Technology of Fruits and Vegetables’, Techniques in Floral Arrangement’, ‘Herbal Technology’, ‘Mushroom Cultivation Technology’ and ‘Ecotourism’ courses floated under the NEP syllabus are creating a lot of interest and enthusiasm among students. As part of extension services, the department conducts programmes for students of neighbouring schools and higher secondary schools. The department has received a major research project grant from the Goa State Research Foundation, Government of Goa, for “Study of Angiospermic and Microfungal Diversity associated with Myristica swamps of Goa” for a duration of 3 years starting from March 2024. Career opportunities for students include continuing further studies to obtain M.Sc., M.Phil., and Ph.D. degree; continuing research as a career; employment as teachers/professors in academic institutions; employment in state and national organizations and administrative services; self-employment opportunities as landscape gardeners, florists, horticulturists, progressive farmers, etc.

Department of Zoology

The Department of Zoology has earned for itself intra and inter institutional peer recognition for its teaching programs, research, consultancy and extension activities across the state and country. The department also houses a Animal Tissue Culture Laboratory, Natural History Museum and the Biodiversity Research Cell (BRC), which collaborates with many regional and national research institutions with a mandate of training our students in field biology and also documenting the biodiversity of the state. Alumni of the department have been occupying academic and research positions in institutions across and outside the country. Centre for research in Zoology with facilities for doctoral research is established and affiliated to Goa University. Faculty members have funded research projects in specialized areas of Zoology.



Department has procured an advanced Imaging Research Binocular Microscope of Japanese make Meiji Techno with retinoid Screen for real time visualisation and recording. Department has signed MoUs with eminent State Bodies and are also members of Government Bodies. Faculty of the department is well traveled for academic collaborations and research. College is currently headed by the member of the Department.

Department of Mathematics

Mathematics as a subject was an integral part of the college since its inception. The faculty of mathematics has made a conscious effort to grow in sync with the directions of the Institute and in awareness of the larger needs of the society.

The department provide opportunities to the students to choose their career in education and research in various field of Mathematics. The role and use of mathematics has increased manifold in the last decade with the onset of the information revolution that has impacted several other disciplines as well. Skills in computational mathematics are needed more than ever before. Keeping this in mind, the department runs several foundation courses for all students pursuing Arts, Science and Commerce degrees to lay a strong foundation to the various fields of Mathematics. The department aims to deeply involve in research and share the knowledge to the academic and industrial sectors through publications, lectures, collaborations and consultations.






